Cognitive-Constructivist Theory (Piaget, Froebel and Montessori): Parents and teachers (usually) stand back and let children learn in solitude in resource-rich environments; Sociocultural Theory (Vygotsky, Bruner and Rogoff): Parents and teachers usually interact with children to guide their learning.

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
