Terminology of Communication Disorders: Speech-Language ...

A communication disorder may result in a primary disability or it may be secondary to other disabilities. A speech disorder is an impairment of the articulation of speech sounds, fluency and/or voice. An articulation disorder is the atypical production of speech sounds characterized by substitutions, omissions, additions or distortions that may interfere with intelligibility.

Ankyloglossia - limited movement of the tongue due to abnormal shortness of the lingual frenum; commonly referred to as tongue-tie. Apraxia- a disorder of articulation characterized by impaired capacity to program the position of speech musculature and the sequencing of muscle movements for the production of speech.

Apraxia of speech (AOS) is an acquired oral motor speech disorder affecting an individual's ability to translate conscious speech plans into motor plans, which results in limited and difficult speech ability. By the definition of apraxia, AOS affects volitional (willful or purposeful) movement patterns, however AOS usually also affects automatic speech.
